Introduction

- (b) Discuss imperialism and the Decolonization process in the 19th century.
- (c) Assess the impact of the rise of Fascism, Nazism and Marxism-Leninism on European society in the 20th century.
- (d) Discuss the World Wars, the Cold War and its aftermath.
- (e) Critically analyse the events that led to the end of communist rule.
- (f) Show understanding of the major socio-political and economic trends in the world from the 19th and 21st century.
